

## **CROSS SECTION 'DRAWING' of Water**

Fish come in all colors, shapes, and sizes. They are found in oceans, seas, lakes, ponds, and rivers. Fish that gather together for social reasons are “shoaling”. They swim together as “fish schools”. They can turn as a group, contract together, expand themselves, or part and come back together while swimming.

### **Materials:**

- 12” x 18” blue constructions paper or smaller to glue fish on
- copy paper: 8 ½ “ by 8 ½ “ square to practice on for fish in water and 1 sheet for “talking fish”
- copy paper: smaller square for individual fish ex. 2” by 2”, 3” by 3”, etc.
- markers, color pencils, crayons, etc.
- scissors
- glues

1. place base sheet down: horizontal
2. use a blue marker to draw line up towards top of paper
3. part of it can be between body of water and sky
4. part of it can be the shoreline with green trees, etc.
5. fold “origami fish” the same size or different sizes and glue in water
6. create a “school of fish” or individual fish
7. on the “bottom” add a treasure chest, rocks, sunken ship, water plants, etc.

Note: In theory, William Kidd is the only pirate who is believed to have buried some of his wealth on Gardiners Island near Long Island, New York.

8. To share ‘fish conversations’ with a friend, “fold” the talking fish and pull and push the tail while telling stories of treasure, tales of old, etc.
